## You have now have your new computer – what next?

Web browsing is another important use for the computer and there are many different browsers to choose from and will just list a few here: Microsoft Edge (comes with MS Windows 10), Google Chrone Mozilla Firefox and the list goes on. The choice depends upon you and what you want – I would suggest trying a few and finding out for yourselves, because not everyone likes the default one in MS Windows 10, Edge.

Security and protection – this something that some users overlook and others are more concerned about. Should you use free or subscription services, should you use basic antivirus or full internet protection and lastly, should you use password storage applications or a simple book of passwords and login details? These are all choices that you will or should be considering and everyone has their own opinions about which are best and which they prefer.

Microsoft updates can be a real problem for some computers and not an issue for others. But, they are essentially there to protect the operating system and ultimately to try and prevent security breaches.

Just remember why you purchased the computer in the first place and what you wanted to use it for. Also consider that it will need some kind of maintenance and that could be preventative or repair work – this will be your choice. Remember to always keep your data safe and backed up and make sure that you are both careful with the internet sites you visit and what you download onto your new computer.
